- The world we inhabit is not fair to most of its people. Every hungry child is a disgrace, Every refugee camp a scandal. Do not give in to despair and denial. A better world is possible, Justice for the earth and its peoples can be reached If we all join hands. This is and remains God's blessed world.

What can you do?

Here are some suggestions for churches, study groups, youth clubs, social institutions:

- Every family, every neighbourhood, every school and every nation need their peacemakers. If you are not yet one of them try to become one. Join committed groups and agencies. Help to dissolve prejudices against foreigners, make space for the rights of minorities.
- Help to strengthen the ecumenical commitment of your church. Go the extra mile to understand the situations of women and men of other faiths. Let not religion divide your community!
- Form a group to study what the Bible says about peace, justice, mercy. Connect this with the needs and problems of today's world. Write your own ecumenical peace declaration and then act on it!

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Our mandate

The International Ecumenical Peace Convocation will be the Harvest Festival of the Decade to Overcome Violence and at the same time a planting season for fresh initiatives.

Throughout the Decade many churches and groups have engaged passionately in creating alternatives to violence. They have struggled with the structural and cultural roots of violence.

They have elaborated educational programmes to uphold the value and dignity of life. Large networks of peace initiatives and action groups have come into play.

The WCC Assembly in Porto Alegre decided that these and many other similar efforts need to have a clear focus.

This is what the **International Ecumenical Peace Convocation (IEPC)** is called to provide.

At the same time, the Porto Alegre Assembly decided that the churches should be invited to create an **Ecumenical Declaration on Just Peace** to be brought to the IEPC as a compelling expression of our common calling to be instruments of God's peace wherever we live.

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Our motto

Glory to God and Peace on Earth

The motto sounds familiar, easy and cosy. Christmas-like. But the angels' song over the fields of Bethlehem turns the world around: In Jesus, Mary's son, God comes to live with us. God's peace embraces all of human life, and more: all of creation. That is God's glory.

This is the peace that we as Christians are graced to serve. We are called to be God's peacemakers wherever we live. This is our way to glorify God.

The motto tells us: God's peace is wider than our concepts of peace. «The peace of God surpasses our understanding», says St. Paul. This is very good news indeed. For it helps us to remain realistic in the midst of all the cheap peace talk among us. And, more importantly, the peace of God sustains us in situations of frustration, in anxieties and bitterness. As St. Paul says: «it keeps our minds and hearts in Christ Jesus, our Lord». It keeps us going.
