Healing in a time of HIV/AIDS

II cilence kills, stigma kills," retired Archbishop Desmond Tutu of South Africa recently told an interviewer from Christian Aid. "Let us, as a church, speak out and speak up. HIV/AIDS is not God's punishment for sin. You have got to say that quite firmly and categorically. How can it be said that a child who has AIDS through mother-to-child transmission is being punished for sin? If it is a god who is punishing them, then that god is one I would not worship!" As part of the plenary pro-

gramme today, panelists will report and compare responses to the challenge on a number of fronts. Gracia Violet Ross Quiroga is an evangelical lending support to people living with HIV/AIDS in Bolivia; Anthony Allen serves as a psychiatrist in Kingston, Jamaica; Japi Heath, an Anglican priest who is himself HIV/AIDS-positive, will discuss his experience in South Africa.

In his conversation with Christian Aid, Archbishop Tutu encouraged the church to take bold action in society: "The church should speak out firmly against stigmatization. But this must go hand in glove with legislation that ensures people living with AIDS are not discriminated against in their jobs, for example. We, the church, should be at the forefront of this. We follow a master who has always been on the side of those who are having a hard time. So we have got to be where Jesus is."

Staggering statistics

The global AIDS crisis staggers our imagination. The scale of human loss undermines the social and economic fabric of entire nations, especially in Africa. At current rates, 100 million people worldwide will be infected by 2010. Of the 14,000 persons infected each day, 85% live in the developing world.

Ruth's Reflections

Philoxenia

More than half way through this conference and though we are on a secluded site, the richness of the Greek context has been clearly evident. We have experienced warm, generous hospitality (philoxenia) from our hosts. The singing at the Orthodox morning prayer that 'Christ is risen', with its deep resonances, was very moving. The cultural evening brought us examples of music, song and

dance from Greece, full of life, energy and beauty that got us dancing too. Sunday visits to local parishes will give us further opportunity to engage with the Greek context, both the Christian churches and to see more of the city of Athens. The sending service at the Areopagos will bring together the past, as we gather at the place where Paul spoke to the Athenians, with the present as we conclude our time together. In the light of all that the conference is, hopefully too the future of our mission and evangelism will carry something of what we have gained in this visit in Greece.

Opoku Onyinah

A Pentecostal perspective

The Rev. Dr Opoku Onyinah, rector of Pentecost University College in Accra, is a conference advisor. He has become a leading

contributor to consultations on healing from Accra to London to Santiago, Chile. An executive council member of the Church of Pentecost, he is familiar with his Ghana-based church's missionary outreach in 54 nations. Last month, he conducted training for leaders of his church in Italy.

"I have been a pastor for 29 years," he says, "and I have served as an 'apostle of the church' - one who plants congregations, trains local leadership and sends out church members to pray for healing and the coming of the Holy

Spirit. In this conference, I am able to share my experience as a minister, a missionary and an educator."

His church is the second-largest in Ghana; only the Catholic Church has more members. The Pentecostal Council of Ghana often cooperates with the more broadly ecumenical Christian Council of Ghana. The Church of Pentecost belongs to both councils.

Dr Onyinah has been impressed by the mission conference. "It brings together many different Christian traditions and allows us to compare views, and this is done fairly. If Pentecostals were in charge, we would have gone a little farther. We would call people forward, and pray for their healing. Spiritual healing is essential, even when a person is beyond cure. But sometimes healing also leads to curing, and that is a wonderful thing!"

The conference leadership entirely respects their right to hold different views, but also upholds the right of participants to peace and tolerance.

Today's theme, HIV/AIDS, will be introduced in two panels. On the first panel, Bernard Ugeux, a Roman Catholic anthropologist and theologian from France, and Erika Schuchardt, a German member of parliament and expert on counselling, focus on different aspects of the healing ministry. The second panel with Gracia Violet Ross Quiroga, Anthony Allen and Japi Heath will reflect on the HIV/AIDS pandemic. Ross Quiroga is an evangelical lending support to people living with HIV/AIDS in Bolivia; Allen serves as a psychiatrist in Kingston, Jamaica; Japi Heath, an Anglican priest who is himself HIV/AIDS-positive, will discuss his experience in South Africa.

Sister Ancelle Melezan Martinique

I am a sister of Mother Teresa and that's why I wear this white robe. I come from Jordan where we have two communities working among the poorest of the poor. I find this conference a very interesting opportunity to share personal experiences.



Father John Bonub Egypt

World News

Haiti murder convictions quashed

Haiti's Supreme Court has overturned the convictions of dozens of military leaders found guilty in 2000 of murder and torture. They were convicted of mass killings during an attack on supporters of former President Aristide in the shanty town of Raboteau in 1994.

History of Mission Conferences

New Delhi 1961

The integration of church and mission became effective in the WCC at the seventh assembly in New Delhi.
The mission councils affiliated to the IMC became affiliated to the Commission on World Mission and Evangelism of the WCC.
The Division on World Mission

and Evangelism took over the programmatic work and responsibility of the IMC, which ceased to exist.

Mexico City 1963

The perspective of mission was enlarged in **Mexico City** to encompass all continents, and not only those of the "South". Meeting during

the first development decade, the conference dealt intensively with witness in a world where God was active, inviting the churches to join in missio Dei. It was the time of a positive appreciation of secularization and of non-religious formulations of Christian faith and action, in particular in the West.

The Anglican Church of Greece

The first Anglican representative from the British and Foreign Bible Society arrived in Greece in the early 1830s. In 1843 the foundation stone of Saint Paul's Anglican church was laid in Athens. Today the Anglican Church in Greece has about ten parishes and communities for ministering to those Christians whose roots are in the English-speaking world.
