#### **Globalization of Churches**

The 1960s and early 1970s are known as a time of social and political change, technical advance and visionary student protests. The increase in the number of "Third World" countries on the international political scene led to a significant shift of world view and called existing power structures into question. As for the churches, the World Council of Churches (WCC, Geneva) played an important role in the growing political involvement of the Christian community. Milestones in its work were the conference on Church and Society in Geneva 1966, where half of the participants came from "Third World" countries, and the WCC Assembly in Uppsala 1968, followed by the implementation of the Programme to Combat Racism. In this period, the WCC developed from having a European-North-American orientation into a global institution, with a worldwide reach.

The international and interdisciplinary conference 2011 seeks to examine this ground-breaking change, from a global historical and ecumenical perspective. Researchers from a variety of contexts and disciplines will provide their insights and discuss the different historical, theological and political criteria that led to the global transformation and renewal of ecumenical Christendom.
